ABBEYFEALE COURT OLD GAEL PASSES

Fishery Prosecutions Late Mr. D. J. McCarthy

CHARGES UNDER LICENSING LAW

(From Our Correspondent)

Before Mr. T. J. O'Sullivan, Acting Justice, at Abbeyfeale District Court, Limerick Fishery Board, represented by Mr. R. A. McAulay, solicitor, charged a number of defendants for illegal fishing in the Feale.

James Ganey, water-keeper, stated that he found Maurice D. Stack using a stroke haul in the Feale on the 12th of May. He had him under observation for some time, and produced the stroke haul which he found in the water.

Defendant pleaded guilty and was fined £2, which the Justice afterwards reduced to £1 and 7/- costs.

OTHERS CHARGED.

There were a number of charges preferred against J. Murphy, P. H. Browne, R. Ruark and P. O'Connor for throwing stones in the river Feale at Craughduff, using a net, etc., on the 22nd or 23rd of May last.

Mr. Maurice F. Noonan, solicitor (Messrs P. T. Liston and Co.) defended.

Wm. Maxwell, a youth of 14, was examined at length, as was also Patrick Foley, whose statements to the Guards did not conform in parts with the evidence now given as to the netting and hauling out of some salmon from the Feale by three of the defendants named.

Mr. MacAulay applied to have the witnesses regarded as hostile.

Defendants denied using a net at any time or taking salmon with a net or selling illegal salmon. The stones thrown in the river were at an otter in the river.

THE DECISIONS.

The Justice said he had decided on convicting of using a net in the case of Ruark, and fining him the minimum fine, £5, and £2 expenses of the witness from Care. There was a doubt in the case of Murphy for throwing stones in the river, and the charge would be dismissed. Browne for using a net would be fined £5, £2 costs and £2 expenses. In the case of O'Connor he would impose a fine of £5 and £2 costs but no expenses. He dismissed the charges against Browne of throwing stones. He gave a month to pay; in default two months in jail. In the case of an appeal he would fix the recognisances at £5.

LICENSING LAW.

In a licensing charge against Mrs. Kelly, brought by Guard McDermott, Superintendent Mulcahy prosecuted and Mr. R. MacAulay, solicitor, defended.

Mr. MacAulay admitted the facts and the minimum fine for repeated offence, 40/-, was imposed. Two found on the premises were fined 5/- each.

Mr. Maurice F. Noonan, solicitor, who appeared for Mr. Fitzgerald in a similar case by the same complainants, said the publican had been ill, and as the doctor in attendance was leaving two men came to the door who were friends and the daughter admitted them.

"MUST CONVICT."

Justice—I must convict; what is the record?

Mr. Noonan—The premises were licensed since 1853, and we were not caught very often during that time (laughter).

The Justice said he had no option but to impose the minimum, 40/-, not to be recorded. Those found on the premises would be fined 5/- each.

Guard McGill summoned J. Daniels for having defective lights, etc., on his motor lorry.

Defendant was fined 7/-.

In a second charge the Probation Act was applied.

STRIKING TRIBUTE TO HIS MEMORY

The death of Mr. Denis J. McCarthy, N.T., of the Square, Abbeyfeale, who had been in charge of the third and fourth standards of the local boys school for 39 years (writes our Abbeyfeale correspondent) is very much regretted in West Limerick and Kerry. Deceased was in his 60th year, and was a prominent member of the old Gaelic football team when it figured successfully in many a county final. For many years after he retired from the team he was the main-spring of Gaelic athletics in the district, and succeeded through many difficulties in maintaining a virile football club active in county and inter-county contests. Few masters succeeded, as he did, in retaining the affections of his present and past pupils, or took such pains to inculcate a real love for native pastimes amongst them. He introduced inter-school contests and single handed promoted juvenile sports at a time when athletics were waning in the West. Every body knew and like "Denis," for his popularity required no distinctive surname to sustain it. He was an outstanding character and personality amongst the Gaels. He devoted his life to ideals along the simple useful lines of life, and had no place for the sordid and effeminate modes. In the long procession of motors which met the remains on their way from Dublin, where he died in a private nursing home, nothing was more impressive than the number of his pupils who contrived to be there by any and every means. At Mountshannon, outside the town, the football team took the coffin, on which reclined his football togs, on their shoulders, while younger bands of his pupils that had been out-paced by the long procession of motors were helped by the interval to demand their place in the cortege as it moved into the town. In St. Mary's Church the football team kept vigil beside the casket throughout the evening. At the interment in the Old Abbey, the attendance of the public was the largest for a considerable time.

On the removal of the remains from St. Mary's Church the coffin was again borne by the club members, the captain bearing the colours in front. In Dublin many of his old friends, comrades and past pupils were present when the remains were taken from the nursing home in Jarvis Street. Many expressions of sympathy have been conveyed to the members of the family, including Dermot, his son, a prominent member of the local team.

DISPENSARY ACCOMMODATION.

Correspondence was read from the Department asking what steps had been taken to provide suitable dispensary accommodation in Askeaton, Adare and Galbally.

The Secretary said he had requested the Engineer to report on any suitable accommodation that might be available for dispensaries in the districts referred to.

Chairman—The doctor in Galbally says that there is no suitable alternative accommodation for a dispensary there, and recommended that a new dispensary be built there.

Dr. McPolin said that the present dispensary in Galbally was unsatisfactory.

Secretary—The Board decided that the present time was not opportune to build a dispensary there.

Mr. Hogan said that he would endeavour to secure suitable alternative accommodation, and further consideration of the matter was adjourned.

LATE DR. J. B. HAYES.

The Secretary said he regretted to have to report that since the last meeting the death had taken place of Dr. J. Bouchier-Hayes, former medical officer and dispensary doctor for Rathkeale No. 1 District, who had retired on pension last year.

Senator Madden said he would like to propose a vote of sympathy with the relatives of the late Dr. Hayes, who held a very distinguished record in the medical profession and took a distinctive part in the national life of the country. He was prominently identified with the Gaelic League revival as long ago as 35 years, when the movement was far less popular than to-day. He (Senator Madden) regretted very much that Dr. Hayes had passed away so shortly after his retirement from public life.

Mr. Hartney seconded the vote and endorsed the remarks of Senator Madden.

The Secretary, on behalf of the staff, and other members, associated themselves with the resolution, which was passed in silence.

RESIGNATION OF COOK.

Sister Berchmans Dunne wrote resigning her position as cook at the Croom Co. Hospital.

The Secretary said that the matron had made temporary arrangements for the carrying out of the work pending the making of the permanent appointment.

The Board approved of the arrangement and decided to advertise the permanent post.

X-RAY WORK IN COUNTY HOSPITAL.

The Board had again under consideration the question of making arrangements for the carrying out of the X-ray work in the County Hospital.

In this connection, a letter was read from the Department recommending the appointment of a radiographer to carry out the work.
