Recent Death.

The death has occurred at his residence at South Quay, Newcastle West, of Mr. Michael Nash, late of Ballyquirk, Newcastle West, at the fine age of 87 years. In his youth he had become apprenticed to the cabinet making trade and had the distinction of being the last surviving link with that industry. In later life he emigrated to America, where he resided for many years, and on his return took up farming at Ballyquirk. Some years ago he retired and had since been living in the town. He leaves one daughter.

Another Death.

The death also occurred during the week of Mr. Pat Collins, of Camas Monagea. He had also passed the 80 years mark, but was one of those men who retain in their old age the vigour and hardihood of men who in their youth had the stamp of health. Many people will recall, on hearing of his death, those balmy days before 1921, or perhaps a few years earlier, when, amongst other parishes around, Monagea boasted a fife and drum band and the familiar figure of Paddy Collins and the big drum, which looked so little a thing on his deep and broad chest. His interest in music and song led him towards the breeding of canaries and in this he was one of the most successful hereabouts. His funeral to the family burial ground at Monagea was attended by the whole parish.
