CROWDS LEAVING A DANCE HALL.

Dr. Holmes, answering Mr. McMahon
said that even if the sound-proof appar-
atus proved effective a nuisance would
still be caused by big crowds leaving

used for cultural purposes only. He
never had any intention of preventing
the members of the Mechanics' Institute
having reasonable amusement, but he did
object to the hall being sub-let by the
Institute for dances.

Mr. McMahon suggested that his Wor-

tion until it had been established that a
nuisance had been committed.

The Justice said that having regard to

PARCELS POST TO GREAT BRITAIN

The British Postal Administration has
advised the Irish Post Office that, in
view of the conditions under which the
parcel post is at present operating in
that administration, claims in respect of
delay to perishable articles contained in
registered or unregistered parcels sent
to or received from this country cannot
be entertained. The public is advised,
therefore, not to forward perishable
parcels by post to Great Britain. No
claim for damage through delay to any
such parcel will be entertained.
