**SWIMMING BATHS**

**Strongly Urged For Limerick**

**IMPORTANT MEETING HELD**

**ARGUMENTS IN FAVOUR OF PROJECT**

With a view of discussing the best ways and means of having an indoor swimming baths constructed in Limerick, a meeting under the auspices of the recently formed Swimming Association was held in St. Michael's Temperance Hall on Wednesday night last.

Rev. Dr. Cowper, C.C., St. Michael's, presided at the meeting, which was representative of all the Swimming Clubs in the city. Amongst those present were: Rev. **GREAT NEED FOR SWIMMING BATHS.**

Addressing those present, Dr. Cowper said that on behalf of the Limerick Swimming Association under whose auspices the meeting was called, and on behalf of St. Michael's Temperance Society, he would like to bid ceaseless mile falte to all present.

Continuing, he said they all knew from the notice they had received what the object of the meeting was. A short time ago the existing swimming clubs in Limerick came together and decided to run a swimming gala. The success of that united effort was responsible for the existence of the Limerick Swimming Association. When the Association was formed their thoughts turned immediately to the question of an indoor swimming baths. Their committee was particularly keen to further the art of swimming in Limerick, and the first necessity was to have some place to swim.

It was unnecessary for him to deal with the great need for an indoor swimming baths, and judging by the attendance at the meeting they all seemed convinced of the fact that it was necessary both from the hygienic and moral points of view. In many countries, especially in England, the Irish people had the reputation of being unclean, and really there was some foundation for that. He would like to know what per centage of our people had even facilities for cleaning themselves. He thought that those present would be surprised if they had the figures at their disposal.

**NECESSITY FOR UNITED EFFORT AND CO-OPERATION.**

Concluding, Dr. Cowper said that in connection with the present project there was a great necessity for united effort and the co-operation of all those interested would be very welcome. Quite a lot had been done by the different swimming clubs individually and collectively to impress on the powers that be the great necessity for a baths, and he felt that if they kept on trying they would succeed. If they were determined to put the project through they must succeed.

Mr. Michael O'Malley said that the idea of a swimming baths had been in the minds of the people for the past eight years, and when Mr. Geraghty was City Manager a deputation was sent to him in connection with the matter. He received the deputation very favourably, and told them that they had his greatest sympathy, and asked them to submit specifications and plans. This was done and the matter rested at that. The plans had since been lost. However, when Mr. O'Mahony was City Manager they went to see him several times and they were received favourably and he promised to do everything he could. Mr. O'Mahony went away and they had to start all over again with Mr. Berkery, and for the third time they were promised that he would do all he could.

**EFFORTS LAST YEAR.**

Continuing, Mr. O'Malley said that this time last year they had a meeting somewhat similar to the present one, and a committee of about six went to see Mr. Berkery and told him what happened at the meeting. At that meeting the majority of those present were in favour of an indoor baths but one or two wanted an outdoor pool. When they went to Mr. Berkery he said he would report back and from that day to this day they had not heard from him officially. They were now in the same position as they were in 1922.

Comparing an indoor baths with an outdoor baths, Mr. O'Malley said that the latter could be only used for about four months of the year while an indoor baths could be used all the year round and would enter for everybody. From every point of view he considered an outdoor baths out of the question. If an indoor baths were constructed a wash house could be attached. There could be one place for people to wash themselves and another place could be used for washing clothes. If the scheme went ahead it was agreed to ask the Corporation to incorporate facilities for the people to wash themselves. From the public health point of view a baths of any kind would be a great asset. It would enable the young people to learn how to swim, and this would be a great advantage where life saving was concerned. This year the Clare Life Saving Association had rescued thirteen people from drowning and this was no mean accomplishment.

Concluding, Mr. O'Malley said he had received a letter from the Secretary of the Munster Branch of the Irish Amateur Swimming Association, who had received it from the Minister for Finance. The letter, briefly, was to the effect that the Minister was quite willing to put up money for the construction of baths provided that sixty per cent of it would be spent to relieve unemployment.

Mr. J. Byrnes proposed that the meeting adopt a motion to the effect that there was a great necessity for an indoor baths, public wash house and special showers in the city. In proposing the motion, Mr. Byrnes

**PROMINENT FIGURE**

**Highly Esteemed Citizen Passes**

**FUNERAL OF THE LATE MR. D. O'CALLAGHAN**

It is with very sincere regret that we chronicle the demise of Mr. Daniel O'Callaghan, a highly esteemed and respected citizen which took place in St. John's Hospital, Limerick, on Saturday after a long illness. Deceased was second son of the late Mr. Edward H. O'Callaghan, a former Mayor of Limerick, and brother of Mr. Michael O'Callaghan, who also had held the office of Mayor, and who was shot in his home by British agents in 1921.

The late Mr. O'Callaghan was a man of many sterling qualities and his death has occasioned widespread regret and sorrow. Over forty years ago he was admitted a solicitor and took up practice in his native city. For some years prior to the Treaty he was Clerk of the Petty Sessions Court, an office from which he retired when he became Managing-Director of Messrs. E. O'Callaghan & Sons, Tanners, an industry that had been founded by his grandfather.

Mr. O'Callaghan was a universal favourite. Quiet and unassuming, he was held in affectionate regard by all classes. His popularity was not confined to Limerick, but extended over a wide area, and on different occasions he was honoured by the Irish Tanners' Association and other bodies connected with the trade and commerce of the city.

In the industrial progress of Limerick he took a very great interest and as a Director of the Chamber of Commerce he did much to advance the city's claims and interests in many directions.

A very well-read man, he had a deep knowledge of many complex questions, but the arts, especially music, had a fascination for him, and in that connection it should be observed that he was an accomplished pianist.

Very sincere sympathy will be extended to the widow and relatives in their bereavement.

The funeral on Monday from St. Munchin's Church to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery, after Requiem High Mass, was of very large proportions, being representative of the professions, commercial, and labour classes in the city.

**DEATH OF EAST LIMERICK DOCTOR**

Very sincere regret is felt in Kilmone and surrounding districts at the death of Dr. Maurice Fitzgerald, which sad event took place at his residence, Ardpatrick, on Friday, 29th inst. Dr. Fitzgerald was a member of a family whose ancestors had served Ireland in every generation. After the famous Knock-long Station raid he attended to Dan Breen, Sean Hogan, S. Robinson and Sean Treacy, R.I.P., at David Clancy's in Cush. During the summer, autumn, and winter of 1920, also the spring and summer of 1921, he travelled across country for miles during curfew hours to attend the wounded and sick of the East Limerick Brigade. On one occasion whilst attending a wounded man, the British military raided the district. The patient had to be dressed and put standing beside a ladder, on which a thatcher was working, until the raid was over. Dr. Fitzgerald remained for hours after beside the patient's bed lest he would suffer from relapse. Amongst his many comrades who attended his funeral was Colonel Liam Hayes, who was wounded at Dromkeen Ambush, and who was a patient of his for many months. His remains were removed to Ardpatrick Church on Saturday evening, 21st inst., and were interred at Abbey, on Sunday, in the presence of a large assemblage of mourners.

A 23-year-old farm labourer, Michael Aherne, of Shanakill, Kilmoyry, received fatal injuries when he was kicked by a horse at Kilmoyry on Thursday last. He was immediately removed to the South Infirmary, Cork, but he succumbed on Saturday.

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Rev. Father Carroll said he presumed that the Government would expect the local authority to put up a certain amount of the money.

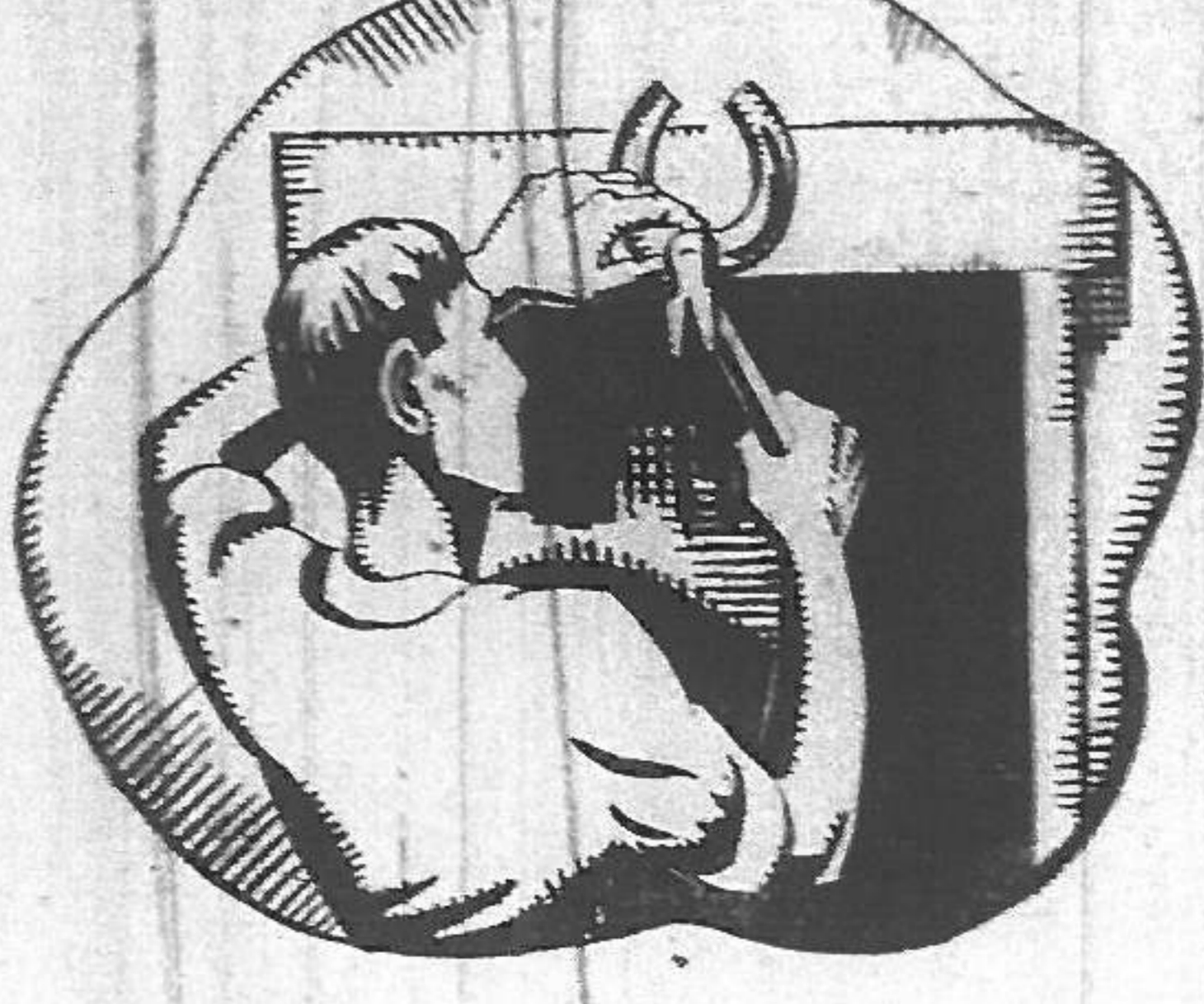
