### Great Charm of Manner.

A woman of wide sympathies, great charm of manner, and innate hospitality, her house was the rendezvous of the young men of the town for many years, and her sweet and loving nature and gaiety of disposition kept many a caller at her cheery fireside. A deeply-pious woman and a faithful member of the Sacred Heart Confraternity, she had the consolation in her last illness of the ministrations of the Church. Although well over eighty years of age, she had until recent months retained much of the vigour of mind and body of her earlier years, while her deep sincerity and personal charm remained unclouded till the end.

### The Obsequies.

Her remains were removed to the parish church, a large cortege accompanying them. The interment took place in the adjoining cemetery after Requiem Office and High Mass and was attended by a large and representative gathering of friends and sympathisers, an eloquent tribute to her great popularity and an index to the widespread sympathy extended to her family. A lady of quiet and pleasant manners, unobtrusive disposition, and irreproachable character, she was held in the warmest regard by those who knew her intimately.
