

for a workman the Justice would have to decide the issue on the question of the greater hardship as between plaintiff and defendant. He (Mr. Leahy) submitted that the greater hardship would be inflicted on the defendant if he were put out of the house.

Mr. Noonan contended that the plaintiff was entitled to possession of the house for a workman in order that he could comply with the increased tillage regulations. If he did not comply with the regulations he would be heavily penalised.

Mr. Leahy—The tenant says he cannot get a house and it would be a greater hardship on him if he is put out.

Mr. Noonan—But he says he did not look for a house.

The Justice said he would give his decision at Newcastle West Court on Friday. If he decided in favour of the tenant he would fix the standard rent at £5 plus rates.
