

SERVICE OUTSIDE BOROUGH AREA

At the meeting of the City Council last night, the Mayor (Ald. D. Bourke, T.D.) presiding, Mr. J. R. Dundon, Law Agent, submitted a report on the Fire Brigade Act, 1940, in which it was stated that the Corporation may now prescribe conditions for giving the service of the Fire Brigade outside their area and the fee which the Corporation were entitled to collect on demand was payable by the occupier of the premises who by himself or his servant or agent, sought the use of the Brigade, or in any other case by the sanitary authority of the district.

Mr. Keyes asked if it were compulsory on the Corporation to send the Brigade outside the city without having a previous agreement with the county authorities.

Law Agent—No, but if it is sent the fee is now collectable. The Brigade need not be sent on the request of an individual in the absence of an agreement with the county authority. In the past there was difficulty in the collecting of the fee for the service of the Brigade, but the recent Act provides that such fee must be paid if the Brigade is sent on the application of an individual.
