### **LATE MR. T. W. O'CONNOR, KILMANIHAN**

The death of Mr. Thomas W. O'Connor,  
a well-known and much esteemed farmer  
(69), of Kilmanihan, Abbeyfeale, which  
resulted from an accident not far from  
his home on Thursday evening of last  
week, is much regretted in East Kerry  
and West Limerick (writes our Abbey-  
feale correspondent). Possessed of many  
excellent qualities, he was much respec-  
ted and very popular in the district. A  
very large funeral procession accom-  
panied the remains from the Tralee Hos-  
pital, where his death took place, and  
on Friday, at the interment in Brosna  
Cemetery, there was also a very large

widow and family. Deceased was a  
brother of Mr. John O'Connor, the owner  
and editor of "The Irish Advocate," of  
New York, which has always given in-
