LIMERICK COUNTY COUNCIL.

**Orders Governing the Exercise of
Powers to Inspect and Take Copies
of Acts from the Books, Accounts
and Documents Belonging to or under
the Control of the County Council.**

NOTICE.

Any elector seeking to exercise his
power to inspect and take copies of
and from any books, accounts and
documents belonging to or under the
control of the Council must in the first
instance fill in and sign a form of re-
quisition specifying with sufficient parti-
culars the book, account or document
required by him for the purpose afore-
said, stating the time (subject to
the regulations) when he wishes to
inspect the same.

The form of requisition may be
obtained from the Enquiry Office at the
Council, and when filled in
must be delivered personally there or
sent by post to the Secretary of the

Books, Accounts or Documents
required for inspection and for
the purpose of allowing the electors to
inspect the same between the hours of either
10 a.m. and 11 o'clock a.m., 4 to 5
p.m., and 10 o'clock to 11 o'clock
on any day, and at no other time.

In the event of the Book, account
or document called for being at the time
of requisition in actual use or re-
quired for the ordinary business of the
Council or any of their officers, the
Secretary for same shall be so in-
formed and an appointment made for
inspection as soon as it can, with
reference to the Council's business, be
arranged.

Books, Accounts or Documents
required of such a nature that they

shall be produced without any avoidable
