## GORED BY BULL

## Fatal Injuries

## EVIDENCE AT INQUEST

Mr. J. S. McNeice, City Coroner, held an inquest at the County Infirmary to-day touching the circumstances of the death of Patrick O'Donnell (52), Dooneen, Crecora, who was gored by a bull on Sunday last and died yesterday in the County Infirmary.

Sergeants O'Reilly, Ballyneety, and Farrah, John Street, conducted the enquiry.

Evidence of identification was given by Mrs. Nora O'Donnell, widow, who said she last saw her husband alive on Sunday at about 11 o'clock.

## STORY OF OCCURRENCE.

Maurice Power, farmer, Ashford, Crecora, said that on Sunday last he instructed deceased and another employee, named James Woods, to drive a bull from a shed into the farm yard. They did so and the bull came out and attacked deceased. At this time Woods was gone to open the gate into the haggard at the back of the shed. Deceased was knocked down and the bull attacked and gored him while on the ground. James Woods and Gerard Halpin went to the rescue and succeeded in driving off the bull. O'Donnell was then conscious but in a state of collapse. He had him removed to the County Infirmary.

## CALLED FOR HELP.

James Woods, Ashford, Crecora, farm labourer, said that on Sunday O'Donnell and himself received instructions to remove the bull from the shed. Witness went to the back and deceased went to the front of the shed. The bull came out at that side and attacked O'Donnell, who called for help. Witness ran to the front of the shed and saw deceased sitting on the ground with the bull standing over him. He drove the bull away with the assistance of Halpin.

Evidence that death was due to shock and paralysis was given by Dr. B. Crawford, House Surgeon, Co. Infirmary.

## THE VERDICT.

A verdict in accordance with the evidence that death was due to shock and paralysis following injuries inflicted by a bull was returned.
