Mr. Reidy—I think it would be a desirable thing if the schools reverted to winter hours.

Mr. Inlan—There is ample light at 9 o'clock. I think we should be reasonable in our requests.

Mr. Reidy—That is all right for well clothed children.

Mr. Reidy—I agree with Ald. Reidy, we would like to have uniform action for all the schools.

Mr. Manager said that he would take the question with the managers of the schools.

RATE COLLECTION.
