PRIORY

On Thursday, 19th inst., Dom Dupiereux, O.S.B., Bursar of Priory for the past ten years, and known to Limerick people, celebrated silver jubilee of his ordination priesthood.

The events of to-day are so reminiscent of that happy event 25 years ago, when Brother John Baj, Belgian refugee in Co. Wexford, was ordained in St. Peter's College, then no idea of remaining in Ireland and left with his Community at the outbreak of the Great War, to return in 1929 to the then newly-founded Priory at Glenstal.

The same vestments which were used at his first Mass in Edermine Ho, Wexford, were used for the Jubilee Mass.

The people of Co. Limerick join in happy wishes to Dom John, and hope that the happy history, which has been written in his life, both for joy and sorrow, and that his dear Community, which he ordained that his dear Community, humiliated in defeat and humble history, may live to vindicate the cause, being small.

After the Mass the workmen presented Dom John with a beautiful Casket and he treated them to a high tea the afternoon.
