Mr. MacAulay—It was a good thing that the matter was raised and ventilated. You have awakened both creameries.

The Secretary said that when writing he drew the attention of the creameries to the provisions of the Fisheries Act, pointing out that if suitable steps were not taken the expenditure of more money might be necessary. He suggested that the Inspector should continue to supervise the places.

The Chairman said that the Secretary could write to the Anglers' Association pointing out that the trouble complained of was due to the stoppage by the dam.
