the case against Mrs. Julia O'Brien, Nicholas Street, who was summoned at a previous court with selling milk not up to the required standard of fats, and said the point had been raised that the milk was not mixed before the sample was taken. The Inspector for the Corporation was not able to say if he had stirred the milk. The regulations provided that the milk should be stirred by the person taking the sample.

The Justice said that the regulations were explicit on the point raised—the milk should have been stirred before the sample was taken. As he had not evidence that the milk was stirred the summons would be dismissed.

Charles Barry, victualler, was summoned by the Corporation for not having refuse removed from his stall properly concealed while being conveyed through the city.

The Justice imposed a fine of 2/6.

DEATH OF MRS. B. O'DWYER

The death took place yesterday of Mrs. Bridget O'Dwyer, at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. McNulty, Upper Hartstonge Street, Limerick. The deceased lady was a native of Grange, Kilmallock, and was mother of Mr. Nicholas O'Dwyer, B.E., the well known Consulting Engineer, and Captain G. O'Dwyer, the famous Army rider. During the Black and Tan campaign Mrs. O'Dwyer's house was frequently raided and it was entirely destroyed by Crown Forces as a reprisal. Her two sons were prominent members of the East Limerick Flying Column and both had numerous hair-breadth escapes.

Mrs. O'Dwyer had reached a fine old age and throughout her long life she enjoyed a very wide measure of popularity.

The remains will be removed to St. Michael's Church this evening at 7.30 o'clock and the funeral will take place to-morrow (Saturday) after Requiem Mass to Grange Cemetery.
