**The Fruit Crop.**

The gooseberry crop was abundant, but in many places has suffered a good deal from the ravages of the saw fly, a nasty little pest that sticks on the backs of the leaves and feeds there out until the bushes had completely bare and then the berries begin to wither up and fall off and those that remain are quite unfit for making the lovely jam that otherwise could be got from them. The black currant appears to be immune from disease and ripened early with the result that the thrifty house-keeper who has them on her own has boiled them into most delicious preserves. The apple crop is just splendid, especially where the precaution has been taken to spray in time.

**The Late Mr. Michael O'Gorman.**

A very notable figure has passed away during the past week. "Mick," as he was familiarly known, was a man of many parts, although the natural reticence of his nature obscured to some extent the real character of a man who was endowed with very many fine traits, and in whose company it was a pleasure to spend a time in discussion of the topics of the day. It has yet to be found that any man overcame him in a game of draughts, in which his vision ahead was nothing short of amazing. And we might add the homely game of "45," in single play or match, in which he had few equals. His capabilities as a wielder of the caman were well known, when he filled the place of full-back for the Effin team in the first decade of the century. He died at his residence, Ballycullane, on the 3rd inst. and Requiem High Mass was celebrated for the repose of his soul at the Church of SS. Peter and Paul, Kilmallock, on Friday, after which interment took place to the family burial ground at Castletown-Conyers. The funeral cortege was of immense size, and a fitting tribute to a man who was highly and deservedly esteemed. R.I.P.
