HOUSE SURGEON'S REPO

In the course of her monthly report the House Surgeon (Dr. B. Crawford) stated that during the month there had been 99 admissions, 99 discharges and 88 deaths. Eight patients were received from the Limerick Hospital and the number of patients in the institution was 68.

The Secretary presented statements of accounts due for the month amounting to a total of £178.

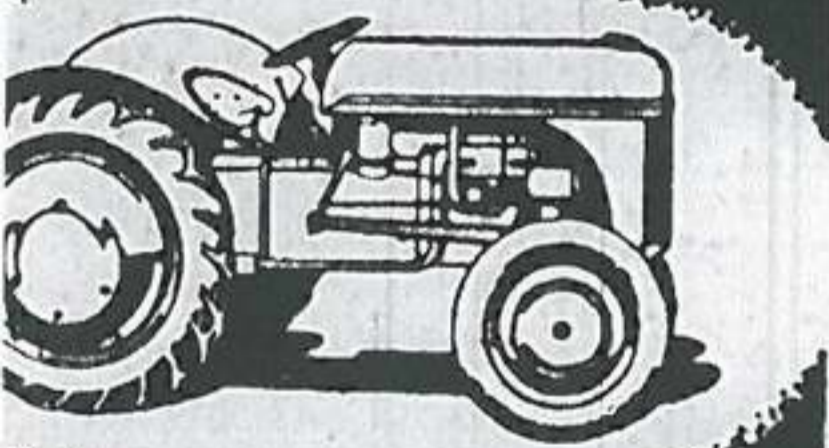
