DEATH OF CANON ORPEN

The death is announced of the Rev. Canon Henry A. H. Orpen, at his residence, Cullin, Crosshaven, County Cork, where he had been living for the past few years since his retirement, which was caused by ill-health. The late Canon Orpen was the youngest son, and the only surviving one, of the late Right Rev. Raymond Orpen, a former Bishop of Limerick. He was a native of Limerick, and served in many parts of the Diocese of Limerick from 1899 until a few years ago, when ill-health forced him to retire. He was made a Canon of St. Munchin's in 1922. Included amongst the places where he served were Limerick, Aghadoe, Adare and Kilmallock. He was also private chaplain to the Bishop of Limerick from 1907 to 1921. He is survived by his wife. The funeral will arrive in Adare at 2 p.m. on Saturday.
