MR. R. B. PEARSON, COOGA HOUSE, DOON.

The death took place on 18th July at his residence, Cooga House, Doon, of Mr. Richard Bolton Pearson. Deceased belonged to one of the most highly respected families in the district. A progressive and successful dairy farmer, he was in many ways a loveable character, and was held in much regard by those who knew him intimately. His death, at an early age, has occasioned sincere regret, especially in his immediate neighbourhood, where he was extremely popular. The many expressions of sympathy tendered to his aged parents and only brother marked the general regret of the public in their sad bereavement.
