ROAD TRAGEDY

County Limerick Engineer

It was learned on Wednesday, that
the man who lost his life in the tragic
accident two miles on the Buttevant side
of Mallow on the previous night was Mr.
James Power, The Glebe, Grange, Co.
Limerick, a creamery engineer and
fitter, who had been employed at the
Mallow Creamery.

The accident occurred shortly after
9 o'clock, when a small car, of which
Mr. Power was the driver and sole occu-
pant, collided with a bus going to Cork
from Limerick.

The car was completely wrecked and
turned a complete somersault, landing
with the wheels in the air, and Mr.
Power was thrown out of it.

Within a few minutes of the crash the
injured man was given spiritual and
medical aid by Rev. Fr. Condon, C.C.,
Ballyhea, and Dr. Kelly, of Charleville,
and he died within fifteen minutes of the
crash.

Mr. Power was a middle-aged man and
married. His family reside at Grange,
Co. Limerick.

Gardai Cavanagh, Spillane and Fennell
of Charleville, were quickly on the scene
of the accident and rendered valuable
assistance.
