DEEPLY REGRETTED

DEATH OF MR. M. QUILLIGAN

With very much regret we announce the death of Mr. Michael Quilligan, who passed away at his residence, 15 Westfields, North Circular Road, Limerick, on Saturday. The deceased, who had been in poor health for a considerable time back, carried on successfully the business of licensed vintner and grocer in Mungret Street. In his business dealings, as indeed in all his relations in life, he was honourable, upright and unselfish to the highest degree. Of a sociable, kindly and good-hearted disposition, he was exceedingly popular with all classes, and the news of his demise at what might be called middle age has caused a painful shock to all who knew him. The possessor of a particularly pleasing tenor voice, he was a very charming singer, and his services as a vocalist were much sought after, and freely given, at concerts and social reunions. He was for years a very valued member of the choir attached to the Augustinian Church, and on numerous occasions delighted big congregations by his rendering of sacred solos. He had a fine knowledge of opera and could give splendid interpretations of several tenor pieces. Of high culture in general and of gentlemanly characteristics, he was a most companionable man and few people in Limerick were as well-known and so widely popular. To his sister, Nurse McMahon, and the numerous other bereaved relatives and friends we extend our very sincere sympathy on their bitter sorrow.

The remains of the deceased were conveyed to St. Munchin's Church last evening and the funeral took place at 1 o'clock to-day to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery. The attendance of the general public on both occasions was very large and representative, thus bearing eloquent testimony of the respect and popularity enjoyed by the late Mr. Quilligan and his highly esteemed relatives.
