PRIVATE'S PLUCKY ACTION

On Monday a child, aged two years, fell into the River Shannon at the Quay, Limerick, and was in danger of being drowned when it was rescued by Private Murphy, a private in the Royal Irish Rifles, stationed at the Barracks, who happened to be on duty and was fully clothed in his uniform and brought the youngster to shore. SERIOUS COLLISION IN EAST LIMERICK

Miraculous (writes our Hospital correspondent) is the only adequate word to describe the escape of the persons involved in the collision which took place at Hogan's Cross, Herbertstown, on last Monday evening, when a lorry, the property of Messrs. W. H. O'Sullivan & Sons, Kilmallock, returning from Herbertstown village, having delivered supplies, collided at the cross with a huge double-decker lorry carrying over forty pigs to the city. Considerable damage was done to both vehicles, especially to the Kilmallock lorry, the engine being cut in two by the impact. The double-decker was flung on its side by the crash, but both the driver and his companion managed to climb out through the upper door and received only minor scratches. The two occupants of the other lorry similarly escaped scathless. The cargo of pigs was not so lucky, the animals being thrown out of the vehicle with great force, and there were several casualties, which had to be destroyed.
