# WORK FOR AMERICAN AIRCRAFT FACTORIES.

"Within a year it is reliably stated American factories will be turning out fighting 'planes at the rate of 3,000 a month, a production speed that 'Hitler cannot hope to equal," writes the "Atlanta Constitution' in a recent issue.

"Even on the cash and carry basis of the United States neutrality law, the Ailies, through the use of American securities, held in England and France and thte component lands of the British Federation of Nations, through gold production and reserve stocks can continue for several years to buy all the 'planes and war materials America can produce for their needs.

"With American 'planes pouring faster andfasterinto Allied hands, Hitler's superiority in the air is fast disappearing, if indeed it hasn't already gone."
