Accident.

Wednesday evening last a serious accident occurred at the cross of Ardagh, which a military lorry and a car carrying a patient to the Co. Hospital, were involved. It would appear the military lorry was the last of a convoy which was travelling on the road between Foynes and Newcastle West and the car was coming down towards the cross from the direction of Carrick and the collision occurred despite efforts of the drivers of both vehicles to avoid it. In the crash Mrs. Margaret Lane, who is an ambulance attendant, sustained a fractured collar-bone but the patient and driver escaped with only slight injuries.

of Many.

This is only one of many accidents which have occurred at this particular cross and it is understood that arrangements have been made, or at least plans have been drawn up, to make this a safer crossing point for motorised traffic. The scheme, it is stated, provides for the moving back of one of the houses on either side of the cross and widening the road at the sides so as to give ample room to vehicles to see at both sides and to manoeuvre out of danger if it approaches.

Water Scheme.

While on the subject of Ardagh the question of the water supply for the village comes to mind, and it is understood that there has been some developments in connection with it during the last fortnight and that the Board of Public Works had some fresh information brought before them at their meeting held on Monday last. A visit had been paid to the village by Mr. G. McAuliffe, water engineer, to complete his canvass of potential consumers and, as a result of his efforts, approximately twenty-three households had signified their willingness to connect their houses with the water main and to pay such rent as might be fixed.

Departmental Requirement.

It is understood also that owing to the desire of a large percentage of people in other towns to avail themselves of water supplies, which have been made available at considerable cost to the ratepayers and the taxpayers, the Local Government Department are now insisting on having before them a list of guarantees which have been obtained to ensure the supply before they issue their sanction to a scheme for a water supply or the provision of a sewerage system and it remains to be seen if they will consider that Ardagh has come up to the mark in this matter. The scheme which may be adopted is an extension of the Newcastle West water main and a
