SHEEP DIPPING ORDER, 1937.

SHEEP OWNERS

are reminded that the above new Order supersedes the Sheep Dipping (Ireland) Order of 1915 and its Amending Orders and requires this year:—

- (1) All sheep, except such as are specially exempted, to be dipped on two occasions during the Dipping Period (1st August to 31st October) with an interval of not less than 7 or more than 14 days between the two dippings.
- (2) Five clear days' Notice to be given to the Local Authority or to the Garda Síochána as to the time of proposed dipping, except in cases where the dipping has to be carried out under Local Regulations at a specified time and place.
- (3) All sheep moved to a Market, Fair, or Saleyard during the period from 1st September to 31st October, to be accompanied by a Declaration that they have been twice dipped subsequent to the last preceding 31st July. (N.B.—This Declaration is not necessary in the case of sheep accompanied at the time by such documentary evidence of dipping as may be prescribed under Local Regulations.)
- (4) A Return by the occupier of every farm or holding on which sheep were located during the Dipping Period to be furnished not later than 30th November to the Local Authority or to the Garda Síochána to the effect that all the sheep on the farm or holding were dipped twice during the Dipping Period in accordance with the Order. (N.B.—This requirement does not apply where the second dipping was done under the supervision of an Inspector of the Local Authority.)

Before dipping in the prescribed Dipping Period all sheep, except lambs under nine months old, must be clipped. During the Dipping Period, dipped sheep must be kept apart from all others that have not been dipped. By "dipping" is meant thorough immersion in a Sheep Dip approved by the Minister for Agriculture. The Place used for dipping must be cleansed thoroughly without delay after

Late Mrs. Riordan.

The death occurred recently at her residence, Ballycahill, of Mrs. Riordan, wife of Mr. John Riordan, and mother of Rev. Fr. W. Riordan, who is ministering in England. Deceased lady had been in indifferent health for some time and her death was not unexpected. Belonging to a highly respected family, she was a splendid example of Irish countrywoman. Mild and gentle in manner, with the courage, virtues and industrious habits of her class, she earned the goodwill and respect of all who knew her for her upright and irreproachable character. To those who knew her intimately she was unfailingly kind and hospitable, and won their affection and regard by her sweetness of manner and amiable disposition. Her death though at a fairly advanced age came as a great shock to her sorrowing husband and family. R.I.P. Her remains were removed to the parish church where Requiem Office and High Mass were offered for her soul on the following day. The interment took place in the adjoining cemetery immediately after, the attendance at the graveside being extremely large and representative, testifying to the great popularity in which the deceased lady was held, and to the widespread sympathy extended to her relatives.
