LOSS TO MERCY ORDER

Deep sympathy is felt with the Mercy
Order, Limerick, on the death of Sister
Vincent Ryan, who passed away at St.
Mary's Convent on Saturday morning
after a brief illness. She had reached the
great age of 80 years, sixty-three of which
she had spent in the religious life. Last
year it was her especial joy to celebrate
the diamond jubilee of her profession.
She had been attached all her life to St.
Mary's Convent, where she was in charge
of the House of Mercy. In this capacity
she was diligent and painstaking, ever
solicitous for the welfare of young girls
who came there for training, and always
anxious to guide them in the proper paths.
Her interest in their lives was not con-
fined to her supervisory duties, for apart
from moulding their characters and
instructing them in the essentials of life
she was always at pains to secure
for them suitable positions in the
outer world. Between her and her
charges there existed a bond of friendship
and loyalty which was manifested in
many ways. Amiable and kindly, she
typified in her whole life the highest form
of religious aspiration, and her death was
in keeping with a lifetime spent in selfless
devotion to those around her.
