DROWNING TRAGEDY

UNABLE TO SWIM

The remains of the late Fireman Eli Sorensen, who was drowned in the har- presided at the meeting of the County bour on Saturday, 7th inst., were washed Limerick Committee of Agriculture to-day. ashore at Foynes Island on Sunday morning last. At 3 p.m. on Monday the inquest was held by the Deputy Coroner, Mr. M. Cussen, Newcastle West.

In reply to Superintendent Mulcahy, Captain Parkholm, of the s.s. "Agneti Marsk," said that Fireman Sorensen was in his usual good health up to the last.

BOAT CAPSIZED.

Fireman Peter Brondalsen, of the s.s. "Agneti Marsk," said that Donkeyman Jensen, of the s.s. "Mathilde Marsk." bimself and the deceased, rowed out in their small craft from the pier at 2 p.m.; en route to their ships. As they neared the island Fireman Sorensen started hoisting the sail, whilst he swung round the boat by the aid of an oar. When the sail was about three-quarters up the boat heeled over on account of the pressure of the wind. It was then found that a lot of water in the bottom shifted over also. The result was that the boat capsized, all three falling into the water. Jensen swam towards the shore. ceased and Brondalsen held on to the The former, who was unable to swim, told Brondalsen that the craft was sinking. The latter, advising his companion to hold on, let go, whereupon the boat became more buoyant. Having advised Sorensen to remain where he was, telling him at the same time that a boat from the s.s. "Agneti Marsk" was approaching, Brondalsen swam for the shore. Deceased shouted after him "I want to come along, as the boat is going down." He then let go his hold. In the meantime Jensen and Brondalsen had reached their footing, but were still in the water. When they again observed Sorensen he was half-way between the boat and the shore. Brondalsen took off his coat, so as to use it as a link between himself and Jensen, who was on his way to assist deceased, but before they reached him he had disappeared.

SMILED AT HIM. In reply to Superintendent Mulcahy, Brondalsen said that he thought the boat would not sink even though Sorensen kept clinging to it.

Mr. M. McCarthy (foreman of the jury) asked the witness if the deceased ing was nervous after the accident.

Brondalsen said he thought that Sorensen was not nervous, as he smiled at him and said he would be able to manage the boat.

Donkeyman Jensen told the Coroner, that he had nothing to add to his comrade's statement.

Guard McDonagh, who assisted at the in blue overalls and that there were no marks on the body, other than were caused by the drowning.

Dr. Agnes Nolan, Shanagolden, the medical officer for the district, said that she had made a post mortem examination of the body and found that death was due to shock and cardiac failure.

The jury returned a verdict in agreement with the medical testimony.

Coroner Cussen, Supt. Mulcahy and Mr. McCarthy expressed sympathy with the Captain and the deceased's companions, and asked the Captain to convey their sentiments to his family.

BECOMING SERIOUS.

Mr. Power said that the situation was becoming very serious. He suggested that a certain sum be set aside by way of subsidy for destruction of foxes.

The Chairman said that hunting organisations would raise a cry of protest if foxes were destroyed, but these organisations should take steps to protect poultry from wholesale destruction. These bodies would be communicated with and if a satisfactory reply was not received action would be taken by the Committee.

CASE FOR INCREASED GRANT.
