Drowning Tragedy.

At noon last Saturday when Fireman Eli Sorensen (30 years) and Fireman Petir Brondalsen of the S.S. Agneti Marsk and Donkeyman Ejvir Jensen of the S.S. Mathilde Marsk were sailing from Foynes wharf to their respective ships a sudden squall caught the sail overturning the little boat. Sorensen, who was unable to swim, clung to the craft whilst his two companions started off to Foynes Island for help. They had only gone a short distance when they heard him calling out that he was following them. Immediately they turned back to prevent him adopting such a disastrous course but they were too late, Eli Sorensen had gone to a watery grave. Fireman Bronalsen and Donkeyman Jensen were fatigued, cold wet, and suffering from shock on reaching the Island. Mr. H. M. V. O'Brien, B.E., took them to his home, Monarc House, and provided them with stimulants and clothes. As soon as they were sufficiently rested they were joined by Sergt. Deesy, Det. Officer Handley, Messrs. D. Corcoran, J. O'Connell, J. Walsh, H. Buckley, and two more of the crew of S.S. Agneti Marsk in Mr. M. Finucane's launch. The party searched about but there was no trace of the body. The officers of the S.S. Matilde Marsk joined in the search but all to no use.
