Passing of Mr. Bryan McGans

The passing of one of Limerich's oldest and most respected citizens, in the person of Mr Bryan McGans, is an event which we place on record with feelings of the most sincere and genuine regret. The sad event took place at his residence on Friday, 23ad inst to his 45th year.

A native of West Clars, the decessed gentlemen was actively associated with with Limerick life for a per-od of over buyears. As far back as 1576 Mr McGans entered the Customs and Excise in Limerick, and with a heen conception of duty, on which he brought to bear anonamon ability he soon won the confidence and respect of his superiors, with the result that long before his retirement he had reached a very high rank in this important branch of the public service.

Bight through his long and honewrab's life he devoted himself to the cause of charity and was an ardent apostle of every movement in Limerick which had as its outlook the help of the mecasitous poor.

A practical Catholic in the truest sense of the word, he was a Diamond Jubliarian of the Arch-Confraternity of the Holy Family, the world famed organisation conducted by the Redemptorist Fathers at Mount St. Alphoeses.

Many years ago now, during the period when the Rev Father John Ureagh was the gifted Spiriual Director of the twat Sodality, and when it was occide to form a Savings Bank in connection therewith, decessed acted as Unneral Mansger of the Bank.
