

# Manslaughter Charge

## A National Teacher's Death

### Evidence At Bathgate Court

At a Special Court in Bathgate, before Mr C G Keay, S.C.,

Michael J O'Leary, Letham, Foyne, was charged with the manslaughter of William Partill, ex-S.T., Foyne by knocking him down with a motor car on Feb 1 January last.

Mr J J Power, State Solicitor (instructions by Dr J D Kelly, Dr J D Macmillan, Norman West) prosecuted; Mr T E Linton, Q.C. (instructions by Messrs P T Linton, solicitor for the defendant); Mr C Treasury, solicitor for the wife of the deceased; Mr T E O'Donnell, solicitor, held a watching brief on behalf of an interested party.

Sgt Dunn, Foyne, deposed that about 8 p.m. on the date in question, in consequence of a report he received he went to Longyed, about a mile on the Glen side of Foyne. About 20 feet from the deceased body he found a woman in a kneeling position at the outer edge of the footpath. He identified her as Mrs Partill, wife of the deceased, who appeared to be injured. Witness had Mrs Partill placed on a car and conveyed to her residence in Foyne. At a point some feet from where he found Mrs Partill witness found a walking stick embedded in a tyre track. Six feet further on he found a gent's bowler hat. The hat was embedded in the road and appeared to have been rolled over by a motor wheel. The full width of the road from the back to the front margin was 30 feet, and including the grass margin the road was 35 feet wide.

Witness continuing, said he was present at Foyne barracks when Dr Nolan examined the accused, who appeared to have been drunk taken. Witness also examined the accused's car and found the front radiator grill broken. The back number plate was pressed in towards the body of the car.

Dr J McDowell, Glass Pathologist, gave evidence of having carried out an examination of brains found and had stained with blood, stated to have been found on the road and on the accused's car.

Inspector W Head said that when he arrived at Foyne barracks accused was present after the accident. From witness's observations he concluded that Mr O'Leary was under the influence of drink. When asked if he had been involved in an accident accused said: "I have come to report one." Witness asked for particulars, but accused seemed to be too worried and upset to do so. Witness then told accused that he would arrest him for driving, or attempting to drive, a car while drunk. Accused replied that he should see a solicitor before making any statement. When told he would have a doctor Mr O'Leary refused to answer one. Witness then consulted Dr Nolan, who examined the accused about 7.30 p.m.

Const. T Power, Newcastle West, produced marks of the car marks and other marks on the road at the scene of the accident. When witness and Const. Connolly were subsequently examining the car accused stated the day in the right rear mudguard was bent when he was turning the car round to report the accident. Accused then added—"I was a damn fool to report it all, as I will be charged with it now," and he also stated—"I don't kill Mr Partill, no matter what people say." Accused had some drink taken.

Det. Insp. T M Hayes, official photographer, Garda Headquarters, produced photographs of the scene of the accident and the car.

John Airey, Bondgate, an employee of Lethal Steel Ltd, deposed when approaching Foyne from the Glen side about 8.30 p.m. he passed accused who was driving in the Foyne direction. Accused was travelling at 30 or 35 miles an hour on his correct side. At a bend on the road witness met Mr and Mrs Partill walking on the wrong side of the road.

James Edmon, Bathgate, Foyne, said when cycling home at about 8.30 p.m. on the evening in question he saw Mr and Mrs Partill at Longyed walking in the Foyne direction. As witness approached he heard a bang in the left direction and just beside Partill's wicket gate between a motor car parked across the road. Sir O'Leary, who was driving the car, then turned to his own side and drove off in the direction of Foyne.

Dr Agnes Nolan, Edinburgh, deposed that shortly after she was returning towards Foyne when she was stopped by a man named Lynch. When she got out of the car she saw Mr Partill lying on the left hand side of the road. Mr Partill was moaning and - spoke to witness. Witness then saw something like a bang on the road further on towards Foyne and it turned out to be the dead body of Mr Partill. Witness subsequently carried out a post mortem. The post mortem revealed that all the injuries were due to extreme violence and were consistent with having been struck or knocked down by a motor car. On the same evening she examined and tested accused at Lethal's condition at Foyne at the request of Inspector Power. She informed the police that accused had drunk beer, but was not capable of driving a car.

John Blenky, Foyne, said that on the night in question about 8.30 he was driving to Foyne and when about a mile from the town he was signalled to stop by Mr and Mrs O'Leary. Dr Nolan then came on the scene. The night was dark and starry; there was no fog and the road was dry and safe.

Denis Ryan, C/C Cavan Street, Larbert, stated that on the day of the accident at 8.30 p.m. accused had a glass and a half of whisky in his father's house previous.

The further hearing was adjourned until May 7th.
