The Forest Trees will be supplied at half the original price to Farmers resident in the County.

## COUNTY LIMERICK COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE.

### SCHEME OF GRANTS FOR ERECTION OF FARM SILOS, 1941/42.

#### ALLOCATION—£2,000.

Conditions relating to this Scheme:

- 1—A grant of a fixed sum will be given for the erection of a Silo in the County.

- 2—Each Silo shall be circular and be erected on an approved site, constructed of mass concrete or reinforced, or of concrete described in the Departmental Circular No. 105.

- 3—The internal diameter shall not be less than 14 feet and the internal height not less than 10 feet.

- 4—A suitable superstructure, not more than 3 feet in height shall be provided, or, alternatively, the wall of the Silo may be raised to a height of 9 feet.

- 5—Adequate drainage facilities shall be provided in the case of each Silo under the Scheme.

- 6—These grants will apply to the erection of the particular Silos of the foregoing types to be erected in 1941.
