

Cattle Market—There were 33 in market; they sold at from 40s. each.

DUBLIN CATTLE MARKET.

Thursday—Number of cattle, sheep and lambs, 5,052. Market going to normal after the holiday lull. Supplies were moderate and higher prices ruling across the board. Sales here for the primer were brisk and prices sharply advanced. Secondary beasts met a steady demand and a good clearance except for light weight heifers, which were not wanted. Best heifers and bullocks, £44/-; fancy drafts of latter, 55/-; and rougher, 45/- to 51/6 per cwt.; best sheep and lambs also in demand and dearer; secondary sorts cleared. Mutton, 8d. to 1/- per lb.; lambs, 30/- to 35/- each. Dairy demand quiet at rather easier prices as experienced from the small supply on the market. The better sorts of heifers sold fairly well for £22 to £27; others, £18 to £21.

DUBLIN PIG PRICES.

Friday (Metropolitan)—Pig market yesterday 850 pigs were offered, 327 for the last day. Quotations: porkers, per cwt., dead weight, 96/-; baconers, 90/- to 94/-, and cutters, 96/-; heavy pigs, 84/- to 90/-; sows, 66/- to 70/-; slips and boners, 20/- to 48/-.
