AND AN APPEAL

(To The Editor "Limerick Leader.")

Dear Sir—The funeral took place
to-day of Patrick Allen, who died sud-
denly at his work on Wednesday last.
He was employed by the Board of Works
for a long number of years as lock-
keeper at the tidal lock at the Canal
Limerick, and a better or more con-
scientious servant they did not pay. His
hours were very long; during the
summer months he might commence
work at 6 a.m. and would not finish be-
fore 10 p.m. He never complained,
always showing a friendly disposition
and having a cheery word with everyone
with whom he came in contact.

He leaves a widow and a daughter,
both delicate; the latter is out of em-
ployment through ill-health. Now the
bread-winner is gone and I do not see
what is to become of his dependents.

Poor Allen had a free house, which his
unfortunate family will have to vacate
unless something is done to help them.
The widow has a brother who has been
employed by the Board of Works from
time to time and is quite competent to
discharge the duties of lock-keeper. If
this man succeeds in getting the vacant
job (he is unmarried) the poor widow
and daughter will not be turned out on
the roadside.

I would, therefore, appeal to our
worthy Mayor and local Deputies, as well
as to the clergy of St. John's Parish, to
use their influence in this most charitable
act of keeping the widow and her
daughter in their humble home—Yours
