**DUBLIN CATTLE MARKET.**  
 Dublin, Thursday—Number of cattle, 114; sheep and lambs, 6,874. Cattle supplies about average for the season owing to later opening of market. Sales were somewhat erratic, but as the day wore on demand and prices settled into more even groove for the better class animals, and coming on to 11 o'clock most of the stock had found buyers at prices inside previous terms. Best bullocks and heifers, 52/- to 54/-; secondary and rougher sorts, 45/- to 51/6 for live cwt. Sheep also more numerous than the primer article well placed at 11/- to 12/-; other slow and failed to clear. Prime mutton, 11d. to 1/1; others, 8d. to 1d. per lb.
