**MR. P. O'BRIEN, WOLFE TONE ST.,
 LIMERICK.**

The passing of an old and respected
 citizen is a matter of regret, especially
 one who has been intimately connected
 with the life of Limerick for more than
 fifty years. We refer to the death of Mr.
 "Pat" O'Brien, which took place recently
 in the fulness of years at his residence,
 68 Wolfe Tone Street, Limerick, after a
 protracted illness.

"Pat," as he was familiarly known,
 was a man of many parts, and had many
 fine qualities of head and heart, with a
 charm of manner all his own. He was a
 great favourite with all classes. The late
 Mr. O'Brien was a life-long member of
 the Limerick City Guild of Carpenters,
 and a Diamond Jubilarian of the Arch-
 Confraternity of the Holy Family.

For many years prior to his retirement
 he held the responsible position of fore-
 man for Messrs. D. O'Sullivan & Sons, the
 well-known Limerick building contractors.
 As a skilled craftsman he had few equals
 in matters peculiar to his calling; and
 his advice was much valued by all who
 needed it. He will be long remembered
 by the older members of St. Michael's
 Temperance Society and Rowing Club for
 his long connection and valuable services
 rendered over many years.
