OBITUARY

MR. JOHN O'NEILL, KILLEELY VILLAS, LIMERICK.

It is with feelings of deep regret that we chronicle the death of Mr. John O'Neill, 3 Killeely Villas, Limerick, which sad event occurred at his residence on Thursday, 2nd inst., after a prolonged illness.

Deceased, who had attained only the comparatively early age of 65 years, was son of the late Mr. Edward O'Neill, Pullough, Bansha, Co. Tipperary, and was for the past thirty years attached to the staff of Messrs. Geary, Sons & Co., Shannon Confectionery Works, Limerick. Prior to joining the staff of Messrs. Geary, deceased was a well-known vintner in Limerick.

A man possessed of many fine qualities, the late Mr. O'Neill during his long association with the business life of the city made many friends who deeply deplore his passing. Deep and widespread sympathy is extended to the bereaved wife and family.

HEAD-LIGHTS GLARE

REFERENCE AT CORK INQUEST

A fatal accident on the Cork-Carrigrohane straight road on the night of the 31st October was described at the resumed inquest on Saturday into the death of John Gerard Foley, 18 1/2 years, of 2 Bessville, Magazine Road, Cork, who while cycling, was fatally injured when knocked down by a motor van.

His companion, Miss Noel Hay, said that the van overtook them from behind and struck Foley. She was cycling about a foot from the kerb and Foley about two feet out and a little behind her. After he had been knocked down a second car came along and she saw it bumping over the body.

Albert Cahalane, a passenger in the second car, said a car with dazzling lights was coming against them when his driver swerved to avoid a man standing, and continued to swerve past an object lying in the road. He felt no bump.

Mr. O'Gorman, driver of this car, corroborated.

Denis Lucey, driver of the van involved, said that his head-lights had failed and he was using his side-lights. There were strong head-lights against him and lights of another car behind when the accident happened. He was going slowly at the time. He had seen nothing on the road.

Sergeant Waddon said that a young man had told him his head-lights were full on, and he would not dim them unless there was a law to compel him to do so. The Sergeant added he had experience of about a dozen accidents in the neighbourhood. "I have no doubt that strong head-lights caused some of the accidents," he said.

The jury found in accordance with the medical evidence.

COMPENSATION FOR BOMBING

A German spokesman has stated that his Government would offer their regret and reparations for possible damage in Eire if it were shown that Germany was guilty. He disclaimed that German planes bombed Dublin on January 2 and 3, but said they might have flown over Ireland by mistake on January 1 and 2.

MR. GEORGE FROST, PORTARINE.

The death of Mr. George Frost, which took place on the 1th inst. at his residence Portarline, Cratloe, removes one who was a figure familiar not only in his native Clare but throughout the surrounding counties.

An extensive and practical farmer, he was recognized as a keen judge of cattle-stock over a period of practically sixty years, and his advice on such matters was much in demand and ever freely given. In failing health for some time back, the deceased gentleman peacefully passed to his reward at the fine old age of 80.

The remains were removed to Cratloe Parish Church on Sunday, and thence to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery on the following day. The attendance at the funeral bore ample testimony of the esteem in which the late Mr. Frost was held by all classes. May he rest in peace!
