LIMERICK COUNTY COUNCIL THE DOGS ACT, 1906.

The attention of the Public is hereby invited to the subjoined Regulations made by the Limerick County Council in exercise of the powers conferred on them by the County Limerick (Control of Dogs) Order, 1907, restricting the movement of dogs by night.

ADMINISTRATIVE COUNTY OF LIMERICK.

Regulations as to the Control of Dogs in the above County.

Notice is hereby given that at a meeting on the 6th day of February, 1906, Local Authority, under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1903, for the Administrative County of Limerick, in exercise of the powers conferred upon them by the County Limerick (Control of Dogs) Order, of 1907, made the following
