Lively Criticisms

CORPORATION DISCUSSION

CONSULTING ENGINEER ASKED TO REPORT

At a meeting of the Limerick Corporation on Tuesday night, the Mayor (Ald. D. Bourke, T.D.) presiding.

Mr. O'Malley referred to the city water service, and said that the supply in the suburbs was totally inadequate. He knew of one family who had to remove to a city hotel because of a water shortage in the suburbs. He was informed that the water supply passing into the reservoir was not sufficient to meet the requirements of the city.

The City Surveyor said that the trouble was due to the frost. In ordinary circumstances the water supply was adequate.

Mr. O'Malley: I'm informed that the pumps at Clareville have to be stopped owing to the inadequacy of the supply.

City Surveyor: That happens occasionally. We have had some bursts in the mains.

Mr. Keyes—I would like to go deeper into this matter. Why have not we got an opportunity to discuss the report from the expert dealing with the water supply from the Shannon Scheme canal. The supply is now less by 1,000,000 gallons per day through the pipe-line than that originally guaranteed. Some explanation should be forthcoming and Mr. O'Malley has rendered a service by raising this question.

THE SOURCE OF SUPPLY.

Mr. O'Malley: The members should go to the source of supply and see conditions for themselves. I got an explanation from the very efficient caretaker, Mr. Walsh, and I think what he told me would impress any one. For the past five years we have been discussing this question, but the officials are inclined to shelve it. We get the hardy annual about the frost, but that is not the root of the trouble at all. I defy any one to contradict me that the water service has failed during the past five years. We were to get a report from Professor Purcell, the consulting engineer, but no report has come before the Council.

Ald. Goodwin said that he agreed with Mr. O'Malley to a point. In 1932 some £30,000 was spent on the water service and they were then told that if the consumption was trebled the supply would be available. The first thing they should get is a report from Professor Purcell.

Mr. Casey said that Professor Purcell was present at a Council meeting about six months ago, when he gave a preliminary report. A detailed report was to follow, but it had not come to hand.

QUESTION OF INCURSTATION.

Manager: At that time Professor Purcell gave it as his opinion that the reduced supply from the pipe-line may have been caused by incrustation. Since then the pipe-line was cut but I have got no further report. If it is the wish of the Council I will ask Professor Purcell to attend a special meeting of the Council.
