PRIEST BEREAVED

DEATH OF MR. J. O'DONOGHUE, MITCHELSTOWN

The recent death of Mr. James O'Donoghue, Lower Cork Street, Mitchelstown, Co. Cork, removes from our midst an old and very highly esteemed resident of the town. Deceased was one of the founders of the local Branch of the Gaelic League and at all the inaugural meetings in this area he was the principal speaker. A native Irish speaker, born at Ballymacoda, Co. Cork, he was possessed of many charming qualities, and his love for the native tongue was always foremost with him. He came to Mitchelstown well over a half century ago and carried on a large general merchant's and farming business and he was highly respected by all classes and creeds in the area.

The remains were removed from his residence to the local parish church, where they lay overnight in front of the high altar. On the following day Solemn Requiem High Mass was celebrated in the parish church and both at the removal of the remains and at the funeral there was a very large concourse of friends and relatives present from all adjoining counties.
