Life-Long Nationalist.

A life-long Nationalist, the late Mr.
Wall figured in many exciting incidents
during the Land League period, and, due
to his activities, suffered a period of
imprisonment. In private life so gentle
and kindly disposed character could
scarcely be found, and his reminiscences
of former times ever made him a wel-
come guest. Having passed his 80th year,
the end came rather quickly, and the
news of his death cast a gloom on his
native locality.
