NOT SUITABLE FOR ALLOTMENTS

(To The Editor "Limerick Leader.")

Sir—In reference to Mr. Casey's remark at a Corporation meeting, in which he stated that the land at Corkanree should be handed over for tillage to the unemployed in Limerick. I consider it an insult to the unemployed of Limerick to suggest any land which is unfit for tillage. I have 18 years experience of land. I held a half-acre at Ballinacurra, known as the Baggot estate. I also held a plot at Corkanree, and I know the difference between good and bad soil. The land at Corkanree is very poor and is very wet all the year round, and, therefore, is unsuitable for potatoes, &c. Mangolds or turnips can be grown there, provided the land is well manured. If the unemployed man is to get land to till, surely it should be understood that he must get land that is worth cultivating. There is another reason, also, why Corkanree should not be mentioned, and that is, it is too near to the fumes of the Corporation dump. Also, we must bear in mind the damage that the rats can do to the crops. If our Corporation think that any land is good enough for the unemployed I think they are mistaken. We welcome plots at the present time and they are badly needed for men with large families, but we must show good results for our toil, and we can see the fruit of our labour by having the best land obtainable. We must also get some guarantee from our City Manager as to how long we are going to be left those plots. Recently the plots at Prospect were taken from the men after all their sweat and labour—all in vain. The hardest part of their work was over when they turned the sod last year and had it well cultivated for this year, when they were disappointed. They had to give them up. That is why we should get some assurance from the authorities.
