DEATH OF MR. P. CARTER

With very much regret we announce the death of Mr. Patrick Carter, 1 Roxboro' Villas, Limerick, who passed away in Barrington's Hospital last evening after a day's illness. Father of Rev. T. Carter, C.S.Sp., and Rev. Father J. Carter, C.S.Sp., he was himself an exemplary Catholic and a tireless worker in the interests of the Church. He was associated with the insurance business since he came to Limerick almost thirty years ago and in his business relations as in private and social life he was deservedly held in the highest respect and esteem by all classes.
