RECENT DEATHS & FUNERALS

MR. DANIEL O'CALLAGHAN, Ex-N.T., DROMCOLLOGHER.

Scarcely has the passing of a well-known figure aroused more widespread grief and sorrow than that of the recent death of Mr. Daniel O'Callaghan, ex-N.T., The Square, Dromcollogher, which took place last week-end at his residence after a brief illness.

One of the oldest surviving members of the old school of the teaching profession, which he entered over sixty years ago, the late Mr. O'Callaghan had a brilliant scholastic career and emerged from the Training College, just then established, with First of First Honours and took up his first position as Principal in Knocktoch N.S. He later transferred to Dromcollogher N.S., where for close on forty years he served with distinction prior to his retirement on full pension close on eighteen years ago.

Few teachers could boast of such a brilliant teaching career, and his fame became so widespread that scholars flocked from all parts to receive his able tuition.

It would be impossible to enumerate the number of clergy, teachers, civil servants, etc., that passed through his hands. Many, in fact, went right from the National School to keenly coveted positions, while all the others will unhesitatingly admit that the secret of their ultimate success was the foundation which they received from his capable hands. Never could it be said that he spared himself as far as the interests of his pupils were concerned, and even in after life he followed their fortunes as a father would his children, sharing with them their joys and their sorrows. As a Christian his entire life was one of extraordinary piety. A daily communicant, he set a shining example to all around him.

In the cinema disaster of 1926 he suffered a crushing blow in the death of his wife, but with true Christian fortitude that was typical of the man, he bore this great sorrow with perfect patience and resignation.

His own family proved to be a distinguished one, and gave two sons to the Church—Rev. P. J. O'Callaghan, Secretary to Most Rev. Dr. Keane, Bishop of Limerick, and Rev. D. O'Callaghan, C.C., Pallaskey, while well known members of the teaching profession are Mrs. M. Aherne, N.T., Dromcollogher, and Mr. Dermot O'Callaghan, N.T., Kilmallock.

An ornament to the profession to which he belonged, during his career he secured the highest honour possible for a teacher to attain, the blue ribbon of the teaching profession, the Carlisle and Blake premium. A staunch member of the I.N.T.O., he was one of the pioneers and most steadfast members of the local branch, and was a well-known figure and eloquent speaker at many Congresses of former years.

The remains were removed to the local church on Saturday evening, and on Monday, Solemn Requiem High Mass was celebrated.

The funeral, which was of huge dimensions, took place to Springfield, and a final and most touching tribute was paid by his past pupils when the remains were borne on their shoulders the entire three miles from the church to the cemetery.
