#### Paraffin Supply.

Most of the confusion that followed the initial stages of the rationing on paraffin has now been obviated and the majority of householders depending on oil for lighting have been enabled to obtain supplies. Sales, however, are being restricted to about half the normal requirements and consumers have been warned that there is no immediate hope of an improvement in the situation. Sales of coal were also rationed during the week and local merchants declined to meet the wishes of a number of customers who sought to purchase surplus stocks.

#### Death of Mr. M. Maune.

The death occurred on Sunday of Mr. Michael Maune, Dromindeel, Newcastle West, one of the best known and most respected farmers in the parish. Aged 82 years, deceased was one of the oldest residents of the parish and the news of his death occasioned widespread and sincere feelings of regret. Having been predeceased by his wife many years ago, he is the last of a family that has been associated with the town for generations. The funeral from the local Parish Church to Ardagh cemetery on Tuesday was one of the largest and most representative seen in the district for many years. Right Rev. Mgr.
