Epidemic under Control.

The widespread epidemic of influenza which has been prevalent in the town and district for the past month is now under control, according to reports received during the week. Hundreds of people were affected with the complaint but none of the cases was serious, although many of the victims were obliged to spend a few days in bed. It was announced during the week that all the schools of the parish, which have been closed for over two weeks, will re-open Monday. The Technical and Secondary schools were not closed, but there was a falling off in the number of students attending both institutions.

Markets.

Potatoes were in ready demand at the local markets on Thursday at 11d. per stone. Supplies on offer were very limited, but it is believed that the potato market will be more or less normal in the course of a week or two with a consequent decline in prices. The small amount of oats for sale on the markets ranged 2/- to 2/2, per stone, and wheat ranged from 2/4 to 3/2, according to quality. Commendable Example.

In connection with the increased food production campaign in his parish, Rev. Hugh O'Connor, P.P., Knockaderry, has set a very commendable example. He has made his best field available, free of cost, to the local Parish Council for tillage and has expressed the wish that meat should be grown on it and stored for the poor of the parish. The generous offer has been gladly accepted and during the week nine pairs of horses provided by local farmers turned up to assist in the cultivation of the land, which is described as ideally suitable for tillage.

The Petrol Shortage.

Motor hackney drivers in the district are seriously threatened with the loss of their livelihood, owing to the very severe restrictions recently imposed on petrol sales. Most of them are only able to carry on hackney work on a limited scale and hire charges have had to be increased to meet the losses. Several private motorists are reserving the use of their cars for business of an urgent nature and there has been a very noticeable falling off in the number of cars on the roads in the town and district.

Paraffin Supply.

Most of the confusion that followed the initial stages of the rationing on paraffin has now been obviated and the majority of householders depending on oil for lighting have been enabled to obtain
