Fair.

Due to the exceptional difficulties of the week-end following the snowstorm and subsequent frost during the week-end, there was only a very limited supply of goods at the February fair on Monday. Buyers were in attendance and the fair was generally restricted to local transactions. There was, however, a demand for old cows, which sold from £5 to £8. Prices for other classes were well up to recent improved quotations.

Potatoes, 11d. to 1/- per stone; oats, 2/- per stone; wheat, 3/- per stone; turnips, 30/- per ton; reed, 18/- to 20/- per ton; eggs, 1/7 per dozen; creamery butter, 1/6 to 1/7 per lb.; farmers' butter, 1/5 per lb.; chickens, 1/3 per lb.; turkeys, 8d. per lb.; turf, 5d. to 6d. per ton.

The Snow-Storm.

On Sunday morning the whole country was covered to a depth of several inches and people living in the outskirts of the parish found much difficulty in getting to Mass.
