Important Notice To Cottage Tenants

Limerick Board of Health and Public Assistance wish to draw the attention of tenants of cottages in the town of Limerick provided under the Limerick Cottages Acts to the urgent necessity of increasing food supplies in the town, and request their co-operation in the efforts which are being made to increase at home, during the 1941 season, the production of foodstuffs possible. The tenants of the plots attached to their cottages will to a large extent be helping in this great effort. They are making provision for themselves and their families during a period of emergency and will be rendering a great service. Tenants are, therefore, requested to take immediate steps to till cottage plots, and the Board confidently hope that in doing so it will be necessary for them to take prompt action to secure compliance with the national demand for increased foodstuffs. Seeds and Fertilisers may be procured from the County Council under the Seeds and Fertiliser Scheme, 1941, and by that body. Allotments Scheme

Notice is hereby given that the Limerick Board of Health and Public Assistance have adopted a Scheme by which tracts of land may be acquired for the purpose of being allotted into allotments for tillage purposes during the 1941 season for the benefit of Labourers living in towns or villages. Allotments will not exceed one acre. An appropriate rent, based on the expenses incurred by the Board in providing the land, will be charged to the allotment holders. Labourers in towns or villages who wish to avail of the benefits provided by this Scheme should notify me, without delay, by letter addressed to the Secretary of Health Offices, Newcastle West, giving the quantity of land they would require to till. Seeds and Fertilisers for the purpose of the Scheme may be procured through the County Council under the Seeds and Fertilisers Scheme, 1941, adopted by that body. Wednesday, February 12th.—Cattle—The entry in both cattle and sheep was of larger dimensions than recent markets. There was a big attendance and full muster of buyers. In cattle section more beef; suitable heifers and bullocks readily placed. Young fresh well-bred cows not too heavy; freely bid for and cashed. The sale of stores was slow, except for nice feeders, especially bullocks, for which there was steady inquiry, and those of the right stamp found buyers. For lots sold prices about held their own. Thin and poor cattle not in favour and hard to cash, unless at low rates. A bigger turnover than last week. Fair clearance. Fat heifers and bullocks, small, £20 10s. to £23 5s.; 1st cows, best, £17 to £22 10s.; second run, £10 10s. to £14 10s.; two year old bullocks and heifers, £12 to £16 10s.; second run, £8 3s. to £11 2s.; yearlings, best, £8 12s. 6d. to £10 10s.; second run, £6 to £8 7s. 6d. Sheep—Numbers showed an increase; more pens of useful sheep. Usual buyers. Trade opened on quiet lines; not as quick of active as last Wednesday, as owners stood out for recent top rates, which buyers were not disposed to give, though best pens touched last week's top prices. Well fed sheep fair inquiry and exchange. Fresh ewes fair trade. Small entry of stores met quiet sale. All round, trade did not run as smoothly, though best sheep held their own, with inquiry, and useful pens were bid for. Good clearance. WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.

Tuesday, February 11th.—The entry for to-day's market was heavier than last week; not many really choice heifers, but quite a number up to dairy requirements; in addition there was a number of choice dairy cows. A large attendance, including some from a distance, all in quest of heifers showing dairy qualities. This description found ready and willing purchasers, with a quick sale; spirited competition and values well maintained; strong inquiry ruled for both heifers and cows, there being no shortage of buyers; competition all round showed cohesion and stability, buyers being willing to part; top values for the right stamp, so that trade was sharp and quick, winding up the day with a good sell-up; three only passed unsold through the "ring." The average price for good heifers and cows worked out something better than last Tuesday. Top price of the market was obtained by Lord Dunraven at £25, and Mr. Wm. Penny got top price for dairy cows at £30. Choice heifers, £23 5s. to £25; promising, £19 5s. to £22 10s.; ordinary, £15 to £18; dairy cows, choice, £26 to £30; ordinary, £17 10s. to £24.—Wm. B.
