Dear Sir—In a few weeks more the old portion of the Augustinian Church will be closed up. The interior to-day shows the old theatre gallery and the arches over the private boxes, which to-day are filled up. What a pity some photographs of the interior are not taken before it is too late. Many of the citizens I know would be glad to see some photos of the old church in the stationers' shops.

In 1810 the old theatre was built and was such until 1823, when it was purchased by the Fathers, who were then at Creagh Lane.
