KILMALLOCK CHURCH

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NEW STAINED GLASS WINDOW

At 11.30 Mass in SS. Peter and Paul's Church, Kilmallock, on Sunday (writes our Kilmallock correspondent), Right Rev. Dean Mulcahy, P.P., V.F., described a newly-erected two-light stained glass window, the bequest of the late Mrs. Mary Lewis, in memory of her daughter, Annie. He explained the changed position of the stained glass window provided by the people of Kilmallock and Ballingaddy about 50 years ago to the memory of Rev. John Costello, who had been C.C. in the united parishes and went to Australia for the benefit of his health, but, to the regret of all who knew him, he died there. The reason for the change in position of the window was to bring the subject matter of it and the glass window into sequence and harmony.

In another window the names of the late Miss Mary Carroll, Kilmallock, and Mr. John Dillane, Mountfox, who had bequeathed gifts of money, are commemorated.

Dean Mulcahy paid a tribute to the donors, and concluded his address by saying that they had stained glass windows that were worthy of the church, windows that would be appreciated for all time, and as the years went by would be appreciated more and more.

The parishioners are deeply grateful to the Dean for all he has done in connection with the beautiful church.

YEAR'S RAINFALL

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FIGURES FOR LIMERICK

The total rainfall as recorded at the Crescent, Limerick, for 1940 was 33.82 inches. During the past 30 years there were three years drier than the past one. These were 1915, 33.50; 1919, 28.20; and 1933, 28.82. The chief characteristics of the year's rainfall are the exceptionally dry January with only 1.81 inches of rain, and a period of drought from May to August. The driest month of the year was August, with 0.49 inches, and the wettest October, with 4.71 inches. The rainfall for the past ten years is as follows: 1930, 48.63; 1931, 43.18; 1932, 34.43; 1933, 28.82; 1934, 36.47; 1935, 44.36; 1936, 43.19; 1937, 36.92; 1938, 47.29, and 1939, 34.80.—W. J.
