

ordained in 1901 at St. Isidore's in Rome, where he completed his philosophical and theological course. He became Superior of the Irish Franciscans at Capranica, Italy, from which he returned to Ireland in bad health. He was a very brilliant and energetic priest, whose untimely death was very widely regretted. His interment took place in Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery, Limerick.

QUARTER SESSIONS.

The Quarter Sessions for Limerick City were opened by Judge Pigot on Friday, April 1st, 1921. The business for the Eastern Division of the County was taken up next day. There was no criminal business to be disposed of from either city or county. The civil business consisted largely of claims for criminal injuries.

SEQUEL TO AMBUSH.

At the sitting of the Court for the Eastern Division claims for compensation arising out of the Dromkeen ambush were heard. On the occasion of the ambush eleven of a party of thirteen police were fatally injured and the relatives of the deceased claimed £5,000 in each case. Having heard evidence at length the County Court Judge reserved his decision.

MR. M. McSWEENEY, BALLYNASH.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. M. McSweeney, Ballynash, Foynes, which took place at the residence of his daughter, Miss H. McSweeney, proprietress of Harratty's Hotel, Limerick. Mr. McSweeney was connected with the railway for many years, having been stationmaster in Listowel and Tubbercurry. Since his superannuation he has been living on his farm, in which he took a very keen interest. In his young days he was a great athlete and always gave practical help to the Nationalist Movement. Last Christmas Day he took seriously ill and had to be removed to hospital. It was soon apparent that this was the beginning of the end. On Friday evening of last week he passed quietly out of this life. The remains were brought to Foynes Church on Saturday evening.

Requiem Mass was celebrated by Rev. Father Quinlan, C.C., next morning. At noon the funeral, which was of large proportions, took place to the family burial ground at Knockpatrick.

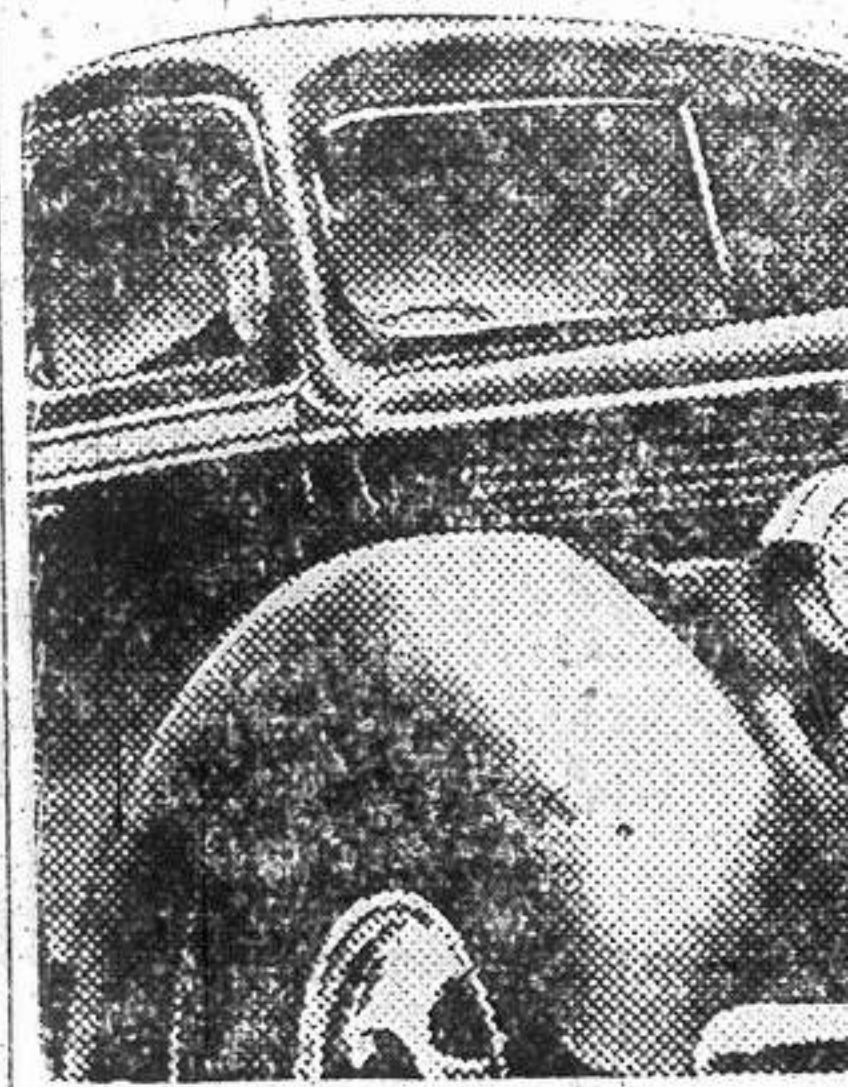
