OBITUARY

MR. M. J. MOLONEY, WEST END, ABBEYFEALE.

The death of Mr. Michael J. Moloney, of the West End, Abbeyfeale, occurred after an illness of some weeks at the fine old age of 96, and removes from the town a well-known and highly respected resident whose affable and cheery courtesy at all times, in his intercourse with the public, will be missed, even outside Limerick and Kerry, where he was so well and creditably known. A leading merchant, whose extensive hardware, provision, hotel and general trading business kept step with progress and development of the town from the early 70's of the last century, and whose efforts at all times aimed at its improvement ranked him as its leading citizen for many years. Generous, broad-minded and possessed of sound judgment in the direction of public affairs and strict probity in the conduct of an extensive trade he was highly esteemed by all classes throughout his long and honourable life. Almost 70 years ago, he helped, unassisted, to restore the local butter market, then the forerunner of the more important fairs and markets subsequently established and since then never failed to give a helping hand to every local and public enterprise that advanced the public good. It is not forgotten that in the great Land League fight of the old days he sheltered fourteen families on his farm at Killeonla.

An outstanding phase of his long life was his strict observance of the practice of his religious beliefs, for his daily reception of Holy Communion for at least sixty years was not only an example to those amongst whom he lived, but constitutes an enviable record for a layman.

Many expressions of condolence have been tendered to the Rev. John Moloney, P.P., Parteen, and Reverend Mother Mary Madeline, of the Mercy Convent, Newcastle West and the other members of his respected family on the death of their generally regretted parent. The attendance of the general public at the removal of the remains to the Parish Church, and at the Requiem Mass in St. Mary's and the interment, subsequently, in the adjoining cemetery on Monday, was equally large and fully representative of many parishes and towns in Limerick, Kerry and Cork.

Town Plots.

Tillage operations on the plots secured by a number of the townspeople have now been completed and should help to prevent at least in some manner any threatened shortage in the potato crop. LIMERICK COUNTY COUNCIL.

FINANCE ACTS, 1920 and 1921, and ROADS ACT, 1920.

Notice to Owners of Mechanically Propelled Road Vehicles.

The Limerick County Council, in pursuance of the powers vested in them under the Road Vehicles (Registration & Licensing) Order, 1921, made under the Roads Act, 1920, hereby warn owners of mechanically propelled road vehicles which are ordinarily kept within the County of Limerick, that immediate steps should be taken to enforce the payment of all outstanding Licence Duty on same.

Licence Duty can be paid through the post or personally to the undersigned between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. with luncheon interval from 1 p.m. to 2 p.m. and on Saturdays between the hours of 10 a.m. and 12.30 p.m., but not later.

In applying for a Declaration Form, on which application for a Licence must be made, the applicant should state the kind of vehicle for which the Licence is required.

Cheques and Postal Orders in payment of Licence Duty should be made payable to "The Limerick County Council" and crossed "Licences: A/c Payees."

Owners of mechanically propelled road vehicles are also hereby notified that the Licence Card shall be carried in the ap-

The Programme.

Free Meals.

Newcastle West Branch of the St. Vincent de Paul Society has asked the Town Commissioners to introduce a scheme for the provision of free meals to the children of poor parents attending the national schools. The Commissioners, it is pointed out, have power to introduce such a scheme, half the cost of which may be financed out of Government funds. The Society calls attention to the urgent need for such a provision, especially during the winter months when the children of poor parents are particularly in need of nourishment.

Provision in Estimate.

It has been suggested that the Commissioners should make provision for the scheme in the town estimate for the coming year. It is not anticipated that the cost will be very heavy and Mr. D. McAuliffe, Co.C., has given notice that he will move the necessary motion when the estimate is being considered. The Commissioners also propose to introduce a scheme for the award of scholarships tenable at the local boys and girls secondary schools. Both proposals, it may be mentioned, will be subject to the sanction of the Department.

Town Lighting.

As a result of representations made to them by the Commissioners the E.S.B. has undertaken to consider the possibility of adjusting the street lamps with a view to effecting a much-needed improvement in the town lighting system. Since the lamps were "cowled" in accordance with the A.R.P. regulations there has been much cause for complaint, as many points were left almost in darkness. It is felt that a big improvement could be effected without any serious alteration. Since the first of the month the public lighting is being put out at 12 (S.T.), an hour earlier than during the winter months.

Fuel Supply.

The Commissioners have decided to make representations to the Co. Surveyor with a view to acquiring a number of turf banks for distribution amongst local people who would be prepared to pay the cost. It is believed that many householders would be prepared to avail of a scheme under which they would be permitted to cut and save the turf themselves and thus obtain supplies of the peat at a low cost. Having regard to the proximity of the bogs it is almost certain that a large number of workers in the town would gladly avail of such a facility.
